Where are Your Quilt & Kits Going?

There are many times I get asked where our Quilts and Kits are sent. This past summer items were sent to Peru, Zambia, Angola, Nicaragua, Tanzania, and South Sudan. This information is on the LWR website and I also get an email twice a year from the Quilt & Kit manager with a general update of where they have sent items. But a lot of you want to know specifically where **YOUR** items went. The statement on the LWR website reads, "The LWR Quilt & Kit Tracker is one way we try to make the world between us a little bit smaller, by connecting the tireless efforts of people who make quilts and assemble kits with the people around the world who receive them with joy and gratitude." Since its inception in 2013, more than 2,280 congregations have used the LWR Quilt & Kit Tracker to see where their gifts of love go and who they help.

The Lutheran World Relief Tracker is how you can actually track **your** specific donations. First you must log into the system by visiting the Quilt & Kit Tracker portal and find your congregation's Donor ID. Then, in order to accurately track shipments, you'll need to print a barcode for each box you wish to follow. The barcode is specific to each box and cannot be changed once you attach it to the box. Also DO NOT mark through the barcode. One half of the pdf you print out goes inside the box and the other half gets securely attached to the outside (not across the opening). Please also attach your normal label to each box that shows the type of kit, quantity, weight, and congregation. We need that information, along with your reporting form, on the day you deliver your donations to the truck. Then about 6 months later you can log back into the Quilt & Kit Tracker and view the report of where your donations have gone. Print this report so you can share it with your congregation. There are more specific instructions about using the Tracker that you can print and follow on the

LWR website.

There are several videos available on YouTube that show how quilts and kits get from your home congregations to the location in the world where they are needed. My favorite is a 13 minute video that shows your barcodes being scanned and attached to the shipments. It also shows quilts and kits being assembled and the looks of joy on their recipient's faces. This is a great video to share with your congregation, at a WELCA meeting, or a Cluster gathering. Tidbits from the Treasurer

The 2019 SES WELCA Convention in Pigeon Forge was a success! We had a great time in fellowship, seeing the sights and worship. We spent \$28,924.79 to host the convention and raised \$31,754.67 in registration, leaving us \$2,829.88 in the black for convention income over expense.

You were also generous in your love offering, giving more than \$3500 towards the SES Advocacy programs. Friday and Sunday's offerings totaled \$5381.49.

The issue raised at convention around the budget for board members and why more was spent than budgeted last year has been researched and is a combination of things, however it essentially stems from board member travel reimbursement. One aspect is the mileage rate in the past years was \$.40 but was reduced last year to \$.32, and remains at that reduced rate this year. Another reason was the location of the board members, in four different states. While we try to be fair and have our quarterly board meetings at different sites, board members still need to travel some distance to attend the meetings. The board is aware of the costs and is mindful of the costs by agreeing to car-pool more often, reduce the number of meals when meeting and/or bring our own food to cook (depending on the location and feasibility).

The 2020-2021 budget was made with the same totals as the previous year, and thus it is expected the board will again exceed its budgeted expense. The line item for board expense will be adjusted to be more realistic in the next budget. Feel free to reach out to me should you have any questions.

World Day of Prayer 2020

World Day of Prayer is a world-wide ecumenical movement of Christian women of many traditions promoting justice and equality through prayer, partnerships, service and celebration. Using “Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action,” as its motto, the World Day of Prayer, is celebrated annually in over 170 countries on the first Friday in March. Every year, the movement focuses on a different country who selects the theme and worship program.

We are invited to join with Zimbabwe, the host country, in a common celebration on March 6, 2020. The women of Zimbabwe challenge us to take up our mats, “whatever they may be for us, and walk.” Like the Apostle Paul, the women of Zimbabwe wrote an epistle to us briefly describing their history as well as their current political, social, and economic struggles, <https://worlddayofprayer.net/zimbabwe-2020.html>.

Instead of staying on their mats, our Zimbabwean sisters are acting on Jesus’ call to action, “Rise! Take your mat and walk,” which for them is a call to love, peace, and reconciliation. Our sisters write, “The action verbs suggest that we should not be afraid to act on the word of God. God is offering us the steps for personal and social transformation.”



The WDP 2020 program is based on Jesus’ encounter with a person who, although positioned for healing, had not acted upon the opportunities given (John 5:2-9a). Jesus asked – “Do you want to be made well?” You are faced with this life-changing question. What are you going to do? Use this opportunity to reflect with

your WDP group, community and ecumenical partners. Prayer and action are what links us together around the globe.

“Rise! Take Up Your Mat and Walk,” said Jesus. Our sisters from Zimbabwe are taking Jesus’ encounter to be a call to act in love for peace and reconciliation. “The action verbs suggest that we should not be afraid to act on the word of God. The 2020 – 2021 SE Synod WELCA love offering, will benefit our Churchwide organization, Women of the ELCA. We are a generous group of women whether by synod, cluster, church or individual, to many organizations, and next year we will support our churchwide organization to continue to do the good works they do to assist our synod and benefit others.

WELCA was formed in 1987 with a mission of “mobilizing women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ”, and that is exactly what the SE WELCA does with such vigor! They assist participants in their desire to discern God's call in their lives and to discover their spiritual gifts through workshops, retreats, resources, scholarships, and global education. An addition, they offer grants to not-for-profit organizations, both domestic and international, that support healing and wholeness for women of all ages through the affirmation and advancement of women's emotional, physical, and spiritual health.

As a part of this vibrant group, we proudly commit to supporting our churchwide organization in 2020 to continue assisting women to do more! †

Thursdays in Black: Resistance and Resilience

Thursdays in Black was started by the World Council of Churches (WCC) in the 1980s as a form of peaceful protest against rape and violence – especially taking place during wars and conflicts - and was revived at the 2013 WCC assembly.

The campaign focuses on ways in which individuals may challenge attitudes that cause rape and violence. Wearing black on Thursdays can be a way to join in the awareness campaign. †

Rachel's Day

Women Boldly Standing For Children

What is Rachel's Day? In 1994, one woman urged her congregation, Bethel Lutheran Church on the west side of Chicago, to support children facing violence. They began by clearing a vacant lot and turning it into a garden— Rachel's Garden. It became a place where folks—mostly mothers—could come to mourn children killed by gun violence in the past year. They also planted a white cross and flowers in remembrance of these young ones. Two years later, the Metro Chicago Synodical Women's Organization brought a memorial to the Third Triennial Convention (1996) of Women of the ELCA to broaden awareness of the violence children face and actions to address it. The convention passed the memorial, resolving "That ELCA women encourage their congregations to recognize the first Sunday in May each year as Rachel's Day, based on Jeremiah 31:15–17 wherein Rachel grieved for her children, to mourn the loss of our children and to renounce the forces of evil and fear that plague our nation."




Today, children are also threatened with death by suicide, often a result of being bullied. Suicide is the third leading cause of death among young people, according to the United States Center for Disease Control. For every suicide among young people, there are at least 100 suicide attempts. More than 14 percent of high school students have considered suicide, and almost 7 percent have attempted it. Bully victims are between two to nine times more likely to consider suicide than non-victims,

according to studies by Yale University. Ending violence seems a difficult challenge today because our children's forms of play—violent online and video games, for example—create a dangerous environment and a formidable opponent for adults who want to protect them. No group of children is safe until all children are safe.

These figures are scary and troubling. Consider starting a Rachel's Day service and looking into ways you can help your community become more aware of these facts. The ELCA web site has many resources for outreach and services. †

There is a great book I would like to share with you. It is ***The Choice*** by Dr. Edith Eva Eger. At the age of sixteen, Edith was sent to Auschwitz hours after her parents were killed. Nazi officer Dr. Josef Mengele forced Edie to dance for his amusement and survival. Edie was pulled from a pile of corpses when the American troops liberated the camps in 1945. Edie spent decades struggling with flashbacks and survivor's guilt, determined to stay silent and hide from the past.

Dr. Edith Eva Eger maintains a clinical practice in La Jolla, California, and holds a faculty appointment at the University of California, San Diego. She also serves as a consultant for the U.S. Army and Navy in resiliency training and the treatment of PTSD. Edie is still dancing—and she ends her talks with a high kick.

Reading *The Choice* I learned to be a hero requires taking action at crucial junctures in our lives, to make an active attempt to address injustice or create positive change in the world. To be a hero requires great moral courage. We can choose to embrace joy and freedom regardless of our circumstances. I finished this book with tears in my eyes and gratitude in my heart. †


